It is pleasing to note that this year's nominations have been even more diverse than last year, with twenty percent of the apprentices nominated being female, as well as nominations being received directly from Durham Cathedral and from several small independent businesses, including Aldersons, Nicholsons and Sons, Johnson Heating & Plumbing, and Focus Joinery.

Further testament to the growth and diversity of the apprentice award scheme is reflected in the backgrounds of the students put forward. Starting at level 1 through to level 6, from York College to New College Durham, from first year students to apprentices that have been forced to break their training before being able to complete their apprenticeship journey with a new employer.

Supporting and rewarding apprentices who work, live or train within the city boundaries is something that I believe is fundamental to the foundations of Durham City Freemen and the Apprenticeship Award Scheme is a positive beginning in reaffirming the Freemen of Durham as the custodians of the City's trade heritage.

The group leader Neil Graham would like to take this opportunity to thank everyone that has been involved in the programme for their continued commitment and support. Introducing the New Chair of Durham City Freemen



Garry Dunnill

I became a Freeman of the Plumbers Guild on the 3rd of February 1997, having been proposed by Alan Atkinson Snr.

After leaving Gilesgate Secondary School at the age of 15 I started working for Harold Fairclough Ltd Hallgarth Street Durham and at the age of 16 signed indentures to start my apprenticeship as a Heating Engineer.

I continued my studies after joining the National Coal Board to be a technician engineer at Charles Trevelyan College in Newcastle upon Tyne, which enabled me to go to Newcastle Polytechnic to gain a diploma in Building Services.

At this time, I joined RW Gregory & Partners. Consulting Engineers in Newcastle as a cost planning engineer where we produced Bills of Quantities. Following this I moved back to Durham and started working for T G Armstrong & Partners Consulting Engineers as a mechanical consulting engineer, during this time I designed numerous projects through-out the country.

After a number of years there I returned to the installation side of the industry and purchased with help from family members Eric Whitfield (Durham) Ltd Plumbing & Heating based in Broompark. During this time, we trained numerous apprentices in both plumbing and heating, some of whom went on to win awards within the industry.

We developed the company within the industry and established an air conditioning side where we worked on a national shopfitting programme though-out the U.K., Eire, Belgium and Holland for Vision Express and many other local establishments.

We continued with the company working on major projects for local Universities Councils, the Health Authority, Catholic Diocese and Durham Castle and various other projects in the north east.

Within this period, I was appointed Chairman of the local Heating Ventilation Contractors Association and organised fundraising dinners, general/training meetings and inter industry meetings with the electrical contractor's association, with the help of a local secretary and represented the area on its national committee. Subsequently I was invited to join the national committee for training within the industry. This was over a 28-year period.

I have always been proud to be a Freeman of Durham and as one of the longest serving Freeman of Wardens feel it is my time with other members to help with the continuation of this long-established tradition by putting myself up for election as Chairman of the Wardens.
